Newest MSLCC Inc. Board Member



Chaplain's Corner

"And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Revelation 21:5, NRSV

Easter is the season of the church year that inspires hope and wells up images of new life. John at Patmos uses the Greek word kainos for new. Kainos is not the common word used in the New Testament for new, which is neos. Neos is when you take an old car and overhaul it and restore it. Or when you remodel a room in your home or take an antique piece of furniture and refurbish it and say, "Just like new!" Kainos represents something completely and comprehensively new, totally new, brand-new!

Kainos is also used in 2 Corinthians 5:17 where Paul wrote, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away, see, everything has become new!" 1 Corinthians 15:17, NRSV Paul is describing you and me. The new creation has already begun. This is why many theologians refer to God's redeeming grace in Christ as "the already and the not yet." The sentence of death because of sin has been reversed, is being reversed, and will someday be reversed. We define this reality with a four-letter word known as hope.

I remember Luther Valley Lutheran Church near Beloit, WI, where the cemetery was just across the road from the front entrance to the church building. Every Sunday when members and guests gathered, they were reminded that we have to walk through death to get to the new life. One life at a time, we are bringing the future into the present. I remember Dr. Priebe at Wartburg Theological Seminary used to say in Christian Apologetics, "Resurrection" doesn't necessarily mean "going to heaven when you die"... It is certainly not about keeping the commands of a distant deity. Rather, it is the new way of being human, the Jesus-shaped way of being human, the cross-andresurrection way of life, the Spirit-led journey. It is the way which anticipates, in the present, the full, rich, glad human existence, which will one day be ours when God makes all things new. Christian ethics is about practicing, in the present, the tunes we shall sing in God's new world."

So think about your deepest hurt, your greatest loss, the place in your heart that is most breakable and broken, and know that you can trust God right now. You can wake up tomorrow and trust God's promise and know beyond a shadow of a doubt that it will be worth it in the end because God really will wipe every tear from your eyes.

Paul Gurholt was born in a small town in Wisconsin to a poor farming family. He quickly learned a hard work ethic that followed him throughout his career. They moved to Watford City during his formative years. It was there, at the age of 13, that he met his future wife, Marcia. They were high school sweethearts and dated for six years through high school and college before marrying in 1968. After attending college at Concordia and then the University of North Dakota, Paul got a job teaching high school math in Braham, MN. Realizing that teaching wasn't his passion, Paul later went on to do construction work for a few years in Minneapolis, and then made his way west.

His goal was Montana, but after a stop in Bismarck to work a construction job, he decided to put down his roots in Bismarck with his wife and family. Paul created a successful construction company and has built and remodeled many homes in his career. When Missouri Slope was looking for someone to build a gazebo in our memory care courtyard, we were told Paul Gurholt would be the man to ask. And eventually, he was.

Paul's carpenter skills also led him into property investments with a friend. Paul did the labor fixing up homes, his partner kept track of the rental income, and his wife Marcia was responsible for cleaning after tenants moved out. She got the dirty work, literally, and never complained or got paid.

Paul and his wife became members of Lutheran Church of the Cross in 1978 and were active singing in the choir, serving on many committees and teaching Sunday school. Paul served two terms on the church council as well as president. He led various construction projects at the church and also spent 25 years volunteering at Camp of the Cross on many rebuilding projects. Even after retiring from 45 years in the construction business, he continued to use his skills to help others whenever possible.

Most recently, he spent one year in Medora working on a facility reconstruction at the amphitheater. He was raised and taught to work hard and give back, and he has lived out that legacy with conviction.

In September of 2012 and after 44 years of marriage, Paul's wife, Marcia, passed away after a six-year battle with dementia. She left behind her beloved caretaker, Paul, their three children, and six grandchildren.

Paul joined the MSLCC Inc. board in 2019 after being introduced to long-time Missouri Slope board member and donor, Alton Larson, while volunteering at Camp of the Cross. He has brought good energy and enthusiasm to both the BOD and the Foundation Board. Knowing he was the man to ask about building our gazebo in the Memory Garden, our Foundation Officer sat down with him to discuss. Paul had no interest in sponsoring the gazebo, he wanted to sponsor both the outdoor Memory Garden and Therapy Garden, with a \$250,000 donation! What a wonderful, unexpected surprise.

Zona went to Mayville State University for two years. While attending, she met her future husband. After college, they got married and moved away from North Dakota. Her husband was an engineer for the state, but his job involved a lot of traveling. They moved throughout the country to cities like Sacramento, CA, and Denver, CO. She liked traveling, but she said it was hard to settle down. While residing in Denver, Zona managed three different restaurants simultaneously. She said she "liked the hiring, hated the firing." In the 1970s, Zona's first husband passed away. She eventually met and remarried her second husband. Unfortunately, the second marriage did not last, and she "had to ship him away!"

Since 1999, Zona has been enjoying a relaxing retirement. She lived alone but enjoyed having time to do what she wanted. She recalled collecting over 80 Santa Clauses over 20 years. She has been at Missouri Slope for nearly a year, but she still remains as independent as possible. Zona doesn't have any remaining family but has close friends who love to visit her. Zona explained, "My friends are my family, this place is my family."

There is much good happening in and around Missouri Slope. Growth is upon us and phase one of our Washington campus is open and vibrant with activity. Residents are "flourishing" according to one medical professional who makes regular visits. Similar comments have come from staff and resident family members too. Our skilled nursing facility is home to 192 bright and pleasant private rooms. Dining, living, and activity rooms are on each of the four floors along with beautiful sunrooms featuring floor-to-ceiling windows.
